



# Force Multiplier map

Background: A force multiplier is used in Military jargon to imply anything that significantly strengthens the user's ability to accomplish their mission. City Council members can be thought of, in their support of the city and community, as force multipliers.

They bringing their rich backgrounds to bear on the challenges a city encounters, and work hard to support our Simi residents.

Maps purpose: Given the size of Simi Valley and the many challenges ahead of it, Simi lacks the proper amount of force multipliers today, to meet the challenges of the future.

Many hands make light work and every city council member today is carrying more than their fair share of weight.

This map intends to support the rest of the council by creating a strong 5<sup>th</sup> district and better define the diverse communities in Simi Valley, by giving them representation and another force multiplier to tackle their challenges.


District 1(Red) <u>Texas Tract & Corriganville</u>: This district is similar to today's district 1 and also includes the Corriganville community that drives the north/south length of Kuehner drive. These two communities are much more strongly linked in culture, socioeconomic background, and travel to and fro one another; yet they are divided in the current city council map. This district 1 best represents and includes these linked communities.

District 2(Blue) <u>Santa Susana</u>: This also closely matches our current map and keeps together the community that live and work around the Simi railroad, known as the Santa Susana community. The heart of this community lives around Tapo Street and they rely on the local Walmart, Vons, and Smart and Final for their supplies, rarely straying outside these district lines. The Santa Susana district also happens to be where I personally grew up, where my parents' home stands, and where my father's business is located. Our family is a microcosm of how tightly knit this community is. This district also properly represents the large minority within that comprises 36.24% of all its residents.

District 3(Green) <u>Our Diverse Downtown</u>: Although Simi doesn't have an actual Downtown given our size, the closest thing we could point to would be the concentrated center heart of the city where a diverse array of our commerce takes place and our community comes together. Similar to District 2, a strong minority is represented comprising 38.73% of residents. In the current city map, district 3 breaks apart the Strathearn historical community into two, between districts 4 and 3, which is very problematic, as it is the only historical site in the city. The Force Multiplier map properly defines and keeps together this distinct historical community.

District 4(Purple) <u>Wood Ranch</u>: Wood Ranch is one of the strongest and closest knit communities in Simi Valley and is similarly represented by the current district 4 map. The Force Multiplier map keeps this community together and matches closely with the current district lines.


District 5(Yellow) Strathearn Historical Community: On May 19, 1978, Strathearn Historical Park was added to the National Register of Historic Places (NRHP) which is a federal register of places deemed worthy of preservation. This is the oldest historical site in Simi Valley and this community is better represented in the Force Multiplier map, as compared to the current city map. See image below of the continuity of District 5 and the Strathearn community. This community also happens to have the largest minority community of all the districts at 39.18%. A minority grouping of this size, the largest in the city, should remain together given federal standards and is not possible with our current district map.



Simi Valley representation compared to Ventura County

Simi Valley has the 3<sup>rd</sup> worst representation in the county with a population of 126,356 residents and 5 city council members (including Mayor), given it a representation of 25,271 resident to 1 council member. What if Simi Valley were more similar to Ventura?

Ventura has 110,763 residents and 7 City council members, giving it a representation of 15,823 people to 1 city council member. The city is very similar in size but because it has two additional city council members, they can act as strong force multipliers and help bring their strengths and background to bear together on the cities challenges. See an image of them and their districts below:



Let's say we wanted to make Ventura more like Simi Valley and we removed the 7<sup>th</sup> District, what would Ventura lose?

Currently District 7 is headed by Joe Schroeder, who is well respected enough by his colleagues to be appointed as deputy mayor. At the age of 35, Joe earned the title of CEO for Point Loma Federal Credit Union and recently retired as CEO of Ventura County Credit Union, which is one on of the largest businesses in the entire county. I have never met Joe or heard of him previous to this redistricting effort, but I am impressed by the business experience and rich history he brings to the Ventura City Council.

If District 7 were removed, and Ventura were to become more like Simi Valley, Joe Schroeder and all his rich business experience would be lost.

How many Joe Schroeders are we missing out on by not adding another district and an additional force multiplier for Simi Valley? Making this addition of another district would change our representation to 21,059 residents to 1 city council member, a much more manageable and responsible representation level.

Given the above and the analytics provided, the Force Multiplier Map ensures Simi has the proper amount of Force Multipliers to overcome any challenge it faces in the future. It means another city council member to help go to events, speak to city residents, and help solve our tough challenges.

No new office need be built, current offices can be shared between city councilmembers, and space already exists for 7 city council member seats in the chamber.

# 4 District Simi Map updated 2020 Census


If the City council does wish to maintain the current 4 district setup, a second map was generated that is similar to the current city map.

The main difference between our current district lines and the one I generated is an attempt to maintain the independence of the Strathearn community in district 1, so as to not be fragmented in the current map, and secondly to maintain the Simi Valley downtown area under the green district 3.


My district 3 is much more compact and follows the lines of freeway in a linear manner which continues into district 2.

The current map crosses the freeway in district 2 in an odd way, for a number of blocks, integrating discontinuous communities; which federal law seems to recommend against(Yellow box). See below:


My map

- #3 Page 14, RES. NO. SVPC 14-2021, under "I HEREBY CERTIFY that the foregoing Resolution was duly adopted by the Planning Commission of the City of Simi Valley, California, at a regular meeting held on December 15, 2021, by the following vote:", the names of the Commissioners are blank for the AYES, NAYS, ABSTAIN, and ABSENT votes, and the Recording Secretary's signature is blank!!!!

- #4 Your December 20, 2021 public hearing Supplemental is not Planning Commissioners' testimony for their December 15, 2021 public hearing meeting; it is a staff summary!!!!!
- #5 Draft Interim Urgency Ordinance No. 1335 does not include the word "INTERIM" in the title!!!!!
- #6 The Draft Interim Urgency Ordinance No. 1335 does not mention the December 15, 2021 Planning Commission meeting!!!!
